Committed to Agriculture, Proud to Be Different

At Mississippi Land Bank, we often talk about how Farm Credit supports rural communities and agriculture. It's our mission, and we're proud to fulfill it every day. But what does that really mean?

As a cooperative, we're owned by you and our many other stockholders. Our board members are borrowers themselves, who are voted into office by their fellow borrowers. They provide important direction and ensure the safety and soundness of our finances. Board Chairman Abbott Myers has said on many an occasion, "I want Mississippi Land Bank to be here for my chil-

dren and grandchildren." It is a top priority for our board members to ensure that Mississippi Land Bank is profitable and will be around for years to come.

When we have a good year, our customer-borrowers benefit. Our net income is used in only two ways: It's retained as capital by our association to build financial strength that ensures continued lending, and in successful years it's passed on to you as patronage dividends that effectively lower your cost of borrowing. Mississippi Land Bank returned a record \$3.5 million to its members for 2017. This lowered the effective interest rate for last year by 60 basis points (or .60 percent). This was also the fourth consecutive year to return in excess of \$2 million to you, our customers. We have returned nearly \$33.5 million since 1996.

Those aren't the only things that make Mississippi Land Bank different. Our staff is willing to go the extra mile — or 100 miles, if necessary — to help you out. We'll come to your farm or business to touch base, talk about your operation, and see if we can provide additional support. What's more, our deep understanding of agriculture is genuine. Most of us grew up in rural areas, and some of us still have a hand in farming, so we personally understand the business decisions you face.

We try to make a difference in your life and your ag business. We can do this by meeting your financial needs, whether it is to purchase land for a homesite or for recreational purposes such as hunting. We can also help with the small tractor, backhoe or other equipment for your small tract of land, or larger equipment such as a cotton picker for your row-crop operation.

Ultimately, however, what makes the Farm Credit difference is personal relationships — such as relationships that are formed when you become a customer-owner of the association or when our loan officers literally take their expertise to your farm or business. We are truly committed to rural America and supporting the men and women who produce our food, fiber and fuel.

IT PAYS TO BANK WITH US

Land Bank Distributes Highest Patronage Payment in History

Mississippi Land Bank was pleased to distribute a patronage of \$3.5 million in February, making it the fourth consecutive year that the association has returned more than \$2 million to members. This distribution represents the highest patronage payout in our history. This year's patronage lowers borrowers' effective interest rate for 2017 by approximately 60 basis points, or .60 percent, on average. Since 1996, Mississippi Land Bank has returned nearly \$33.5 million to our customers.

Land Bank Referral Program

At Mississippi Land Bank, we value our customers. To thank you for your business, we would like to reward your referral of new customers to the association. If your referral meets the following guidelines, you can receive a \$250 referral fee.

To be eligible for the referral fee, you must meet these criteria:

- The referral must be a new customer of the association.
- You and the applicant must notify the loan officer that it is a referral loan.
- The loan must close within six (6) months of the initial notification.
- The loan must be at least \$25,000.
- Only one reward will be paid per new customer.
- For regulatory reasons, referrals are not eligible on consumer purpose loans, or those loans where the proceeds are used for personal/consumer purposes rather than for agriculture or land.


